

Things you already know:

- Have prior knowledge of forms and quizzes
- Have an idea of polling situations such as choosing a class rep or the general election.

Knowledge you will gain:

- Knowledge of why surveys and questionnaires are constructed. Understand that a weight of opinion can often change things.
- Knowledge of what makes a good survey, asking questions that are relevant and that don't lead people to a particular answer e.g. 'Would you like free money?'
- Know how to create online forms (using Microsoft Forms) including different types of fields and the benefits of each of these:
 - Short text
 - Long text
 - Multiple choice (tick box)
 - Single choice (radio button/drop down)
- Knowledge of how to create graphs in Excel using the basic 'Recommended Chart' option.
- Know that open questions are almost impossible to make graphs and charts from as each entry is different.

Vocabulary

Poll: a count of people's opinions about something.

Data: The facts and figures being collected as part of the poll.

Information: The conclusions you can make from the data.

Radio Button: A single choice round button on a survey.

Tick box: A box button allowing usually more than one choice to be selected.
