atholic last term, the Year Children's 6 RE ambassadors Society and School Councillors helped to do a final count up of the monies raised throughout Lent. We were absolutely blown away by the incredible total raised by the children this year. They collectively raised £724.98, the largest amount of money we've ever raised throughout the season of Lent. We are very grateful of your parental support with this fundraising project and we know how gratefully received this money will be by the Catholic Children's Society.

As you have been made aware, on Education Sunday in September 2023 and 2024 Bishop Peter wrote to all parishes to outline the vision for Catholic education in the diocese. As a Rights Respecting School, we emphasise the importance of ensuring all children have the right to relax and play both in and out of school. Year 2 Scientists

Just before we broke up for the Easter break, Dr. Lucas came into school and led a Science session for our Year 2 pupils. He talked to the children about why you need skin cream, what soap/detergent is, and how it helps oil and water mix together. The children then dressed as scientists (with goggles and lab coats), mixed a simple skin cream, observed changes as they worked and thought about what they might add to make it more appealing and more suitable for different consumers. They came up with some really good suggestions such as adding a scent and including some form of sun protection.
